We are tremendously grateful that ECCT is supporting us with \$4k that will (literally) allow us to keep the lights on. Thank you to the ECCT team who assess so many grant applications each month and still see us as worthy recipients.

Carterton Crier Articles

DECEMBER EDITION: The December edition of the Carterton Crier highlighted Miss Berrill's Girls Club which was formed on 10 July 1931 and by August 1933 the Club numbered 100 members. Each year the Girls Club endeavoured to put on a yearly Revue and these occurred most years during the next twenty years. As far as we can tell the Club came to an end in 1955. Miss Constance Berrill passed away in 1959 aged 71 and is buried at Clareville Cemetery. She certainly gave much to the young women of Carterton not only with the Girls Club but also piano and elocution lessons.

FEBRUARY EDITION: February marked the 150th anniversary of the opening of St Mark's church in Carterton and the Society was asked to write an article for the occasion.

READ ARTICLE



Here are some snippets from the article:- Picturesque St Mark's Church was completed on its present site in 1875. It stands as a calm oasis on Carterton's busy High Street, at the Richmond Road intersection, surrounded by majestic trees planted in 1887.

The initial works were funded by a loan from Mr Walker and by a subscription list. Amazingly, when St Mark's was consecrated by Bishop Hadfield in May 1875, the church was debt free.

version of Jingle Bells with a Kiwi slant.







CDHS WINDOW DISPLAYS

CARTERTON GIRLS CLUB



The Carterton Girls Club was the brainchild of the wife of the Rev Rayne (St Mark's) in 1929 and in 1930 Miss Connie Berrill took over the reins. A committee of very keen girls was formed with Miss Berrill as President. Misses Olive Walters, L Fisher and Molly Cole were Vice Presidents. The girls had to be 16 and over, left school and unmarried. The season went from May to November, meeting every week. The costumes and scenery were locally made, though in later years costumes were sometimes hired.

1931

Their first big event was a ball in 1931, held in the King's Theatre, with a decorations colour scheme of orange, green and yellow. Music was supplied by Kirk's Orchestra. With more than 300 guests present it was voted a huge success. The newspaper article goes on to describe which colour each girl wore.

1932

In July 1932 a birthday banquet for members was held in the Presbyterian Hall, and in October a dance in the Galaxy Hall was attended by a large crowd. Featured on the programme were the Broom Dance, Barney Google and Cinderella dances which were heartily enjoyed. Several dancers possessed squeakers and trumpets adding to the fun.

1933

In 1933, more social events were held, raising money towards the Mayoress Relief Fund.

The members of the Club now numbering 100 held an event for their mothers in the Presbyterian Hall, performing small plays, and a display of eurythmic physical exercise, the girls being trained by Mrs Vivienne Hawken.

In August a Combined Clubs Ball was held, the clubs being the Savage Club, Tramping Club and the Girls Club. Miss Berrill organised a savoury supper

Tramping Club and the Girls Club. Miss Berrill organised a savoury supper with many willing helpers and requiring three sittings with each person receiving a hat to wear until the end of the ball.

A dance held in October had guests dressed as Senor's and Senorita's. There were also small items to entertain the guests, even a bull fight.

This year 5 members climbed to the top of Mount Holdsworth with a glorious view from the trig. They noted evidence of vandalism at Mountain House.

They tidied up as best they could.


An end of the season banquet was held in October.

1934

In July 1934 a dance at the Galaxy Hall was attended by over 120 young people. A dainty supper was supplied by the members. A 4th birthday party was held in the St Andrew's Hall in August.

1934 saw the first of many successful shows. "The Magic Ruby" was held in the Kings Theatre and well rewarded. The whole production was tunefully bright, splendidly dressed and artistically performed. There was a repeat performance the following night.





1935

The 5th Birthday party in 1935 was attended by the mothers in the Presbyterian Hall. Miss Nessie Moncrieff spoke on China, a country she had lived in for several years, showing slides and memorabilia, with Chinese dresses being modelled by some of the girls.


At the Annual General Meeting after considerable discussion a mention that the admission age of 16 be raised to 18 was rejected.

The end of the season party saw Miss Olive Wolters congratulated on becoming the first lady member of the Carterton Borough Council in October 1935.

1936

"My Spanish Sweetheart" was performed in 1936 and was another roaring success.

A function held to entertain 'Our Mothers' was much appreciated, and included folk dancing taught by Mrs Hawken.

1938

"Cinderella" was performed in the Kings Theatre in 1938 and another great success. The season was brought to a close after the performance. Messrs Tom Udy and J Pearson were given three cheers when it was known they had given their services to the orchestra free of charge.

1939

In 1939 at the 9th annual meeting of the Club Miss Trixie Millichamp, who had been secretary for a number of years resigned as she was getting married. Later in the year she was presented with a beautifully embossed fire screen and musical honours were performed for her.


At the annual meeting several new activities were discussed, and arrangements were to be made with Miss Thompson, Government Recreation Officer, for physical culture and games. It was decided to open the season with a skating party. Picture parties were also held meeting at the hall prior to going to the pictures and tea.

1940

A Revue made up of small plays, songs and dance and the drill squad display was held in 1940 and repeated the following night to full houses. The Revue was also repeated at Solway College, Masterton. £40 of the proceeds of the revue will be handed to the £1,000,000 Fund as part of the district quota.







1942

With only 22 members in 1942, seven concerts were given to soldiers in different camps in the Wairarapa. These were very popular and always had packed houses. Members also assisted with YMCA Sunday teas at the Camps, and suppers at the Saturday night dances for soldiers in the State Theatre. A dance was held in the St Mary's Hall for soldier friends of members.

The Presbyterian Hall was not available for performances due to blackout concerns and the Fire Brigade Hall was used until after the earthquake when that hall was condemned. The final club night was held in the St Mary's Hall.

1943

In 1943 it was agreed that wives of husbands serving in the forces may join the club for the duration.

Concert parties given to the soldiers in Camp continued throughout the 1943 season. Entertainment was also provided to the American soldiers on R&R in the Wairarapa.

Two Patriotic Concerts was held in November with £40 the proceeds going Soldiers Farewell Fund and £10 going to the Red Cross Society.

1944

Activities for 1944 included Physical Drill classes & Glee and Dramatic Clubs, speakers arranged and several picture parties.

Due to illness of both the President and Secretary no big functions were attempted this year. Club concerts were also held and well attended.

Since the commencement of the war the members have contributed £98 10s towards the soldiers' funds.

1945


In 1945 a Patriotic Revue, or Club Concert, celebrated the end of the war. King's Theatre was packed both nights. After a profit of £45, £15 went to the Red Cross and £10 to the Swimming Baths Fund.

1946

1946 Season started with a Fancy Dress Party, commencing with a banquet and concert.

It was also decided to put together a concert for this year and offer the funds to the new War Memorial fund. They also assisted fundraising in surrounding towns for the same cause.

1947

In 1947 "Aladdin" was performed for three nights in the Kings Theatre. Special thanks goes to Mr Hawken for lighting, and Messrs Goodwin, Pinfold, Steffert, Knowles and Colson for their help with scenery and bookings. £20 was given to the War Memorial Fund.

1948

The Club's season opened with a Mad Hatter's Party In 1948 a tramping group was formed and assistance in Physical Drill with a request for dumbbells. Lectures and play-reading were also given. A scavenger hunt and folk dancing were also on the agenda.

The 1948 season ended with a performance for the Mothers and Fathers Night. £5 donated to the United Nations Children's Appeal

1949

A Club Concert or Revue was held in October. The programme consisted of 15 items with costume and scenery changes. There was not a dull moment and the hearty applause which followed each item was justified. Practices were twice a week, and the concert performed over three nights to packed houses once again.

Table tennis was available some club nights this year. Tap-dancing was also being taught.

A picnic and skating outing was very popular and well attended.

1950

A letter from the Carterton Borough Council thanked the Girls Club for their concerts and said that they were an asset to Carterton.

A performing visit to the Buchanan Home in Greytown was well received. As

were the sweets, flowers and Cigarettes.

1951

The 21st Birthday Revue was the last held in 1951 for two nights. At the end of the show floral tributes filled the stage in a sea of flowers.

Miss Berrill was presented with a silver teapot by (Mayor) Mr R Wakelin in appreciation of her work.

1952

The Club continued to meet weekly with outings to plays and concerts and Physical Culture classes.

1953-1955

The Borough Council requested the Girls Club to assist with the coronation. In combination with the Fire Brigade, they conducted a dance for the young people.

The Girls Club supervised suppers at the Borough Council's request.

They didn't seem to put on any more performances as there are no newspaper articles or minutes which

record this even though the membership was still very good.



"The Magic Ruby" was to be performed but there was a big issue with the scenery, and although rehearsals were well under way, it was decided to abandon the idea. The club assisted at a concert sponsored by the Carterton Band with a 2-part chorus and a tap dance. The season ended with a barbecue at the Waiohine River.

Membership was dwindling and in 1955 the Club folded and went into recession. A sad day for the young women of Carterton.

Miss Connie Berrill 1887-1959 was President for all the years the Club existed. Her dedication to the Girls Club can only be commended. She is to be congratulated for the manner in which she brought those taking part in the programmes to such a high standard of efficiency.

HADLOW SCHOOL PUPILS VISIT TO CDHS

On March 31st, we hosted about 18 students aged between 9-12 years old from Hadlow School in Masterton. The children who all happen to live in Carterton, arrived just before 9.30am with Deb Nelson their teacher, Bryant Booth and a couple of parents.

Maria and I had done some preparation for the visit, which was to focus on the history of Carterton and notable people from the area.

We were a little unsure of how the morning would go, but Maria came to the fore and the children, who sat on the floor, were very interested in what we had to show them.

We talked about John Fensham and the Fensham Reserve, Richard Sayer and Sayers Slab Whare, Mt Dick, Sister McKenzie and her role in early Carterton, Ellen Dougherty the first registered nurse in the world, the early settlers including The Polish community and how the township moved from South Carterton to where the centre is now.



They asked lots of questions and afterwards spent some time looking at the collection of artefacts, we have around the room.

After leaving our rooms, we walked over to Memorial Square, where the students were informed about the War Memorial Cenotaph and to learn about the ANZAC's.

Martinborough Library celebrated
130 years on 18th October, 2024 and it
all started in the building pictured
above. Now known as
Martinborough Museum, this
building was opened as a library in
October 1894 by John Martin.

It was designed in the style of a club house by an architect known as Mr Natusch, who was credited with its design in the Martinborough Star on 20 October 1894. The library was reported to be well stocked with books and periodicals when first opened.

Martinborough Museum volunteers celebrated the end of a busy year in November 2024, and as we have developed a connection with their group, they invited some of our committee to attend.

Martinborough Museum volunteers were about to embark on the journey of cataloguing their paper-based archive, and invited Pene, as guest speaker, to share the joys and challenges CDHS is still experiencing on the journey to cataloguing our own collection.

Maria is the driving force behind our CDHS cataloguing process and she and Deputy Chairperson, Cimone, also contributed to the discussion.

The gathering was held in the home of one of their members and included a delicious afternoon tea with much chatter and sharing of ideas.

Building connections between local heritage groups, serves to strengthen us all.






QUERIES, RFI'S and WALK IN'S


A local resident called on CDHS for assistance to help establish the history of Sister McKenzie's maternity home and hopefully we were able to verify information for them.

PIONEERS & SETTLERS

On Wednesday 25th January 2025 three members of the Carterton District Historical Society were invited to join the NZ Founders Wairarapa Branch on a bus to Petone to celebrate the 185th anniversary since the arrival of the ship Aurora at Petone, Wellington.

After picking up the passengers along the way from Masterton, Carterton and Greytown

we headed over the hill to Taita to visit Christ Church. The land for this lovely church was donated by a member of the English parliament, Algernon Gray Tollemache who had purchased 34 sections in Wellington from the New Zealand Company. Totara trees that were on land owned by John Ings-Daysh were donated by the family for the building of the church. Timber from both John Ings-Daysh and Abraham Harris was milled by Abraham who owned



a pit-sawn timber yard in Taita. The building of the church was done mainly by Sidney Hirst, a carpenter from Yorkshire, with assistance from many of the pioneers in the Taita area. The church is of significant technical interest in that the method of its original construction did not require nails. In a tribute to skills of a past era, the original mortise and tenon dowel joints still remain in the window frames. Sidney is buried in the churchyard.

The charming church and the churchyard are well worth a visit if passing through that way.



From Christ Church we travelled on to the Early Settler Museum on the Petone foreshore to see their displays. The Museum is a local history museum located within the Wellington Provincial Centennial Memorial, and is an historic building. It memorialises the site where local Māori welcomed the first ship carrying organised British settlers to Wellington on 22nd January 1840. Originally constructed to mark the Wellington provinces centennial Commemorations, in the front of the building is a stone replica of the prow of the ship Aurora facing the street. The museum opened in the building in 1977.


On the way from the Museum we drove past the Udy house and stopped for a photo shoot as several people on the bus are

descendants of the Udy family. Our next port of call was to the Māori urupa which is on the site of the Pa of Te Puni the local Paramount Māori Chief. Unfortunately, we were running short on time so this was a shortened visit. Te Puni was one of the signatories of the Treaty of Waitangi and the deed of purchase of the land about Wellington. On the 22nd January 1840 he welcomed the first New Zealand Company settlers to the beach and then shortly afterwards on the 29th April signed the Treaty of Waitangi in Port Nicholson. Te Puni became a firm friend of the new arrivals. His people built houses for the settlers and supplied food in exchange for European clothing and other goods. Chief Te Puni died on 5th December 1870 and he is buried in the family cemetery the urupa at Petone. The Lower Hutt suburb of Epuni is named after him. Petone also has Te Puni Street, Atiawa Street and the Honiana Te Puni Reserve on the Esplanade.

From here we drove to the Petone Working Mens Club where we all had lunch and then headed back over the hill to the Wairarapa.

A great day was had by all and we appreciated being included in this journey back in time.





The ship Aurora was the first New **Zealand Company** ship to arrive in Wellington, docking at Petone on January 22, 1840. It carried immigrants to establish the new settlement, which later became Wellington. The Aurora was a barque of 550 tons, carrying 169 passengers under Captain Theophilus Heale.

CDHS MEMBERSHIP






